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WACHUSETT MOUNTAIN THE CHARCOAL by Rogers

Several years ago the Historical Society received a lovely charcoal drawing of Wachusett Mountain with a beautiful body of water in the foreground. It was a gift of Marie Arcangeli who was a Robillard before marrying Albert Arcangeli. The Robillard family had lived on Batherick Road and we assume the body of water is Round Meadow Pond since the view appears to be from that angle.

We have always been curious to know who the artist was. The signature lightly written at the bottom right is E.H. Rogers. We googled the name and even went on the AskArt website, hoping to find out more information about the artist, but

we found nothing. Was it done by a local or itinerant artist?

How surprised we were to discover in the Fitchburg Historical Society's September newsletter a short article entitled "Help us find information on the life and work of painter Eugene H. Rogers!" It stated, "The Fitchburg Historical Society is currently researching the life and work of a local artist, Eugene H. Rogers (1835-1900). Eugene lived most of his adult life in Fitchburg, as a self-employed sign

painter. During his lifetime, he was also known for fine landscapes and portraits of people and animals. Articles from the *Fitchburg Sentinels* of his time suggest that many of these works were purchased by local families. We are particularly interested in his life as a fine artist."

We were quite excited! We examined Eugene Rogers' obituary in the June 20, 1900 *Fitchburg Sentinel* and found that he was born in Holden, MA, son of Winslow and Cassandra (Harrington) Rogers, and

had a brother Edward, who had been killed in the Civil War. Eugene married Mary Clark of Holden and moved to Fitchburg in 1875, living at 84 Arlington Street.

The obituary ended with this

observation, "Mr. Rogers was so modest that he was his own severest critic. A member of the Boston Art Club urged him to prepare a painting for exhibition in the club's room, but Mr. Rogers expressed the fear that his work would not stand the criticisms of trained artists like the members of that club. Students of art who sought instruction from him were refused solely on the ground that Mr. Rogers lacked self-confidence. When the craze for pastels was at its height several years ago, a Fitchburg dealer suc-

TIME TRAVEL ADVENTURES Living in Westminster in the 1700s

What was life like in the mid 1700s in the colony of Massachusetts – before it declared its independence from Great Britain? Your child can find out during the school vacation in February 2012 at the Westminster Historical Society. The **Time Travel Adventures** is a full week program planned especially for children who want to experience family life in early Westminster. This program is designed to accommodate parents who work, and will provide Extended Care before and after the program, so children can be brought and picked up before and after

the program activities.

Without electricity, communication was restricted to talking, cooking was at the hearth, and sitting next to the fireplace was the best place to keep warm. A typical day at this Time Travel Adventures will include making breakfast and lunch, making a



craft project and playing games. Eating will be fun: children will churn butter, bake waffles over a fire, make and cook sausage on the hearth and make soup in a kettle.

Projects will include making a book to write in and take home, making and writing with a quill pen, building a wooden toy, sewing a potholder, making sleigh bells, and more. Children will also learn about the first families in Town and draw a map of the first homes in Westminster. Wendy Provencial will be the Cooking teacher and a local teacher will be staffing the program the entire week.

The Project Director, Betsy Hannula, has announced that this **Time Travel Adventures** week is for children in Grades 4, 5, 6, or 7. The fee is \$200 plus \$50 for food and materials; the fee is less for a second child in the same family. 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ceeded in persuading Mr. Rogers to make them, assuring him that he could sell all he would produce. The sale increased so rapidly that the demand was far ahead of the supply within 10 days. There were 65 in the first order and 150 in the second. Mr. Rogers' work went to the shores of the pacific and throughout the West and South."

We are grateful to the National Honor Society boys who helped us carry boxes to the Legion Hall and to every person who performed marvelously for the set up and take down.
