During these four years of the nation commemorating the Civil War, we will continue featuring a local story in each newsletter. Mark Landry, our Veterans specialist, has provided all the research on our brave men from Westminster.

HENRY JAMES PARTRIDGE A CIVIL WAR SOLDIER

Henry James Partridge was born November 7, 1840 in Westminster to Amos and Melita (Reynolds) Patridge. (According to Heywood's <u>History of Westminster</u> some generations of the family spelled their name without the "r").

On May 11, 1861 Henry was one of the first ten from Westminster to sign up in Fitchburg for Westminster's quota (he was 20 years old). He was officially mustered into the service on May 25, 1861 on Brook Farm in West Roxbury as a Private in Company D, 2nd Massachusetts Infantry Regiment of Volunteers. The term of service was three years. After their training the 2ndMassachusetts traveled south and was assigned to the Army of the Potomac, where at one point, Henry got sick and was confined in General Hospital #21 at Yorktown, VA.

They were in battle at Winchester in May of 1862 and then the Battle of Cedar Mountain in Virginia on August 9, 1862 where Henry's close friend and comrade from Westminster, Corporal Benjamin Franklin Wilcox was killed in battle. Two days later, when Confederate Gen. Stonewall Jackson's troops retreated from the battlefield, Henry buried Benjamin on the battlefield.

The next month Henry was at the battle of Antietam at Sharpsburg, MD on September 17. This battle resulted in the largest casualties of U.S. troops on

sit in. And, Pat Lasky a veteran Westminster teacher ready to assist the children who wanted to learn how to write with a real ink pen – first dip the pen tip just far enough into the ink well to fill the tiny slot with ink, but not so deep that the black ink gets all over your fingers. Do you remember? They were fascinated!

There were lots of extras too. The wonderful baskets for a raffle with lots of winners. A Powerpoint presentation about our plans for the Upton Center. The exhibits of unique items from school days: erasers for chalkboards. (Today's white boards aren't quite the same!) A six inch block of wood used in the 1960s when girls skirts were far too short for parents and girls had to kneel down on the floor and have their skirts measured. If your skirt wasn't six inches from the floor you had to go home to change! Oh my, how things are different today!

And, tours of the Upton School. The comments were treasures! Do you remember the lines to the basement (where the bathrooms were)? This room had my favorite teacher! MILLER FAMILY DESCENDS UPON WESTMINSTER

The Miller Family came to Westminster this summer to celebrate the 80thanniversary of their first annual reunion in 1932. On August 19 descendants of Jonas and Susan (Bond) Miller gathered at the William S. Miller Legion Post Hall on Main Street. This Legion Post was named for one of their own

ancestors, William S. Miller, who lost his life as a soldier in World War I. Families came from as far away as Oklahoma, and in the 81 years they have been holding reunions, this was the second time they had their reunion in Westminster.

The first Miller in Westminster was Joseph who settled on West Princeton Road in 1740. Succeeding generations of the Miller family lived in Westminster for more than two hundred years later - until the 1980s. In fact, the Westminster Historical Society purchased its current home at 110 Main Street from Gerald Miller, the last Miller to live in town.

All the earliest Millers were active citizens and filled many important offices in town. They were also avid collectors of documents that recorded various historical events in town. J. Hervey Miller survived being a soldier in the War of the Suppression and then came back to Westminster and held many public offices including twenty years as an assessor. He also wrote a fascinating book describing his experiences during the Civil War. Frank E. Miller and other family members were also well known workers at the Westminster Cracker Bakery.

All the members of the Miller family present for their family reunion this summer were descended from Jonas who was born in 1798. Jonas was first married to Betsy Wood, who died a month after giving birth to their first child, who also died. Jonas then married Susan Bond in 1829 and had six children. One of Jonas' sons was J. Hervey Miller. Among Hervey's surviving sons were Frank E. and his half brothers Cyrus T. and Harry W. Miller. Cyrus T. Miller had a son, William S. Miller.

The occasion was a momentous one for the Miller families because of a special donation they made. It all started in 1879 when Jonas and Susan Miller reached fifty years of married life together. Townspeople got together and presented them with a gold headed cane in honor of their achievement. That cane has stayed with the Miller family through all these years, passing to every couple in which the Miller descendant reached fifty years of married life. Eleven couples received and cherished this cane. The

last couple to receive the cane on their 50th wedding anniversary was Frank D. Miller and his wife Marion on February 18, 2011. Frank is the 4th great grandson of Jonas Miller.

At this year's annual reunion the families chose to stop the tradition of keeping the

cane in their homes and instead give the cane to the Westminster Historical Society for safe keeping. The Curator of the Historical Society, Betsy Hannula, was present at the Miller Family Reunion in order to accept this new donation. She remarked how delighted she was that the Miller Family was concerned about the future of the cane, and assured those present that the cane would be available for future generations of Miller family to view.

Past Historical Society President Roni Beal and Board member Darlene Johnson also shared in this event. We brought items from the Historical Society collections that once belonged to the Miller Family for everyone to view. In addition, Miller family members came to visit the Historical Society on Main Street to deliver the cane and 3 old account books to their new home

(Continued from page 1) **Civil War Soldier** any single day in history with almost 23,000 killed, wounded and missing.

Henry was also in battle at Chancellorsville, VA and Gettysburg, PA where his regiment made an assault on a Confederate position at the base of Culp's Hill. The 2ndMassachusetts lost 42% of their men as casualties that day, including Henry, who was wounded around 11 o'clock that morning. He was also taken prisoner and taken to Stanton, then Richmond, VA, then Castle Lightning and finally to Belle Island, where he was stricken with disease and placed in a hospital. After 8 months, he was finally liberated in poor health on March 21, 1864. He traveled to City Point, Annapolis and on to Chattanooga, TN. His regiment was moving through Georgia with Gen. Sherman on his famed "March to the Sea", but before Henry could catch up with them, he was discharged from his service in the Union in May of 1864.

His brother, Amos, also served in the Civil War and died in a southern prison three months after being captured at the battle of Ball's Bluff.

According to Heywood's History, Henry was

"an industrious farmer, horticulturist and mechanic; a man of goodstanding and a deacon in the Baptist Church." He was also a Selectmen for two years. He married Martha Ellis of Westminster on January 15, 1865 and they had four children. He died February 1, 1909 in Westminster at the age of 65 years old and is buried in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.




ANNUAL MEETING
