EUGENE GATES

Eugene Gates was born on January 2, 1839 in Westminster to Leonard and Martha Gates on the family farm on Beech Hill. Eugene was mustered into service on October 17 at Camp Stevens in Groton as a Private in Company A, 53rd Massachusetts Infantry Regiment of Volunteers.

On Nov. 29, 1862, the regiment left for New York, on Jan. 17, 1863, embarked on the steamer "CONTINENTAL" bound for New Orleans and went into camp at Carrollton. Here it was assigned to Gooding's (3d) Brigade, Paine's (3d) Division, 19th Corps.

The Regiment was sent by steamer to Baton Rouge, March 6, to join the force which was being assembled for operations against Port Hudson. They arrived in Alexandria May 8 and found a Union fleet in possession of the town. The regiment began its return march, and arrived May 22, and rejoined the brigade. Eugene's brigade was near the head of the column guarding the engineer corps.

In the assault on the Confederate works, May 27, the 53d was engaged and performed especially hazardous duty in the front line of trenches, losing two killed and three wounded. On June 5th it was sent with an expedition to Clinton about 25 miles to the northeast to drive away a body of Confederate cavalry, returning on the 8th to its position in the trenches by Port Hudson.

The 53d participated in the assault of June 14, being heavily engaged, and losing 18 killed or fatally injured, and over 68 wounded. The regiment remained in front of Port Hudson until its surrender, July 9. On August 12th, the regiment embarked on the steamer "METEOR" for Cairo, arriving Aug. 19, and there took a train for Massachusetts, reaching Fitchburg Aug. 24.

Eugene was discharged from his service on September 2, 1863. He and Helen's children were Luella F. born in 1864 and Albert E. born in 1871.

ARTHUR CHARLES HICKS

Arthur Charles Hicks, known to most people as just "Charles," was born on November 29, 1890 to Lewis M. and Carrie E. (Willis) Hicks in Hawley, MA. Sometime before World War I, the family moved to Westminster and lived at 50 Main Street.

America entered World War I on April 6, 1917 and on May 10 at the age of 26, Charles enrolled into the United States Naval Reserve Forces



(USNRF). His served aboard a receiving ship in Boston Harbor until June 20, 1917 at which time he was assigned to the USS Aztec (SP-590).

The Aztec was originally a steam yacht built in 1902 that was leased to the U.S. Navy in June of 1917. Charles began at the rank of Fireman 2nd Class. He was released from active duty on September 24, 1919 and honorably discharged from reserve duty on May 9, 1921 after four years of service.

Upon his return to civilian life, Charles worked at a box shop as a "chauffeur." He married Esther Helen Gates of Westminster on June



21, 1921. They lived on Bacon Street and had three children, Raefield, Douglas and Lawrence, who all served in World War II.

Nick Langhart and Susan and Pete Yraola came to see the exhibit, which focused on Susan's ancestors—the Gates and Hicks families.

MAPLE SUGARING THIS SPRING!

DOUGLAS HICKS

Douglas Elwood Hicks was born in 1924 to Arthur "Charles" and Esther (Gates) Hicks. The family first lived at 50 Main Street but moved to 15 Bacon Street in 1928.

Douglas graduated from Fitchburg High School in 1942. The yearbook said the following "He thinks before he speaks.....Everyone likes Dougie who always says bright things. He was in the Westminster and high school band, and liked dancing, especially the old fashion kind."

After basic training, Douglas was assigned to a B-17 heavy bomber combat crew as a flight engineer. Critical to the operation of the plane, the engineer had to know all of the intricate mechanical workings and structure of the B-17. If battle damage severed control cables, caused a fuel leak, knocked out the electrical

system, started a fire or any malfunctions, it was the job of the engineer to find the problem and fix it. The engineer also assisted the pilots to monitor the plane on take-off and in flight. They had a control panel located behind the pilot. During combat, the engineer stood on a platform between the cockpit and the bomb bay to man a rotating turret on the top of the plane with twin 50 caliber machine guns. They had to be smart and on their toes during the entire mission.

Sgt. Hicks made his first bombing mission on July 29 and the group continued heavy bombing raids all summer. September 28th was a tragic day for many bomber crews. Twenty-eight 303rd bombers and two borrowed Pathfinder



Force planes took off that morning headed for the Krupp Grusonwerke A.G. at Magdeburg, Germany. Sgt. Hick's crew was flying a B-17 nicknamed "Bouncing Betty II." They encountered moderate and accurate flak at Hallendorf and Gardelegen. As pilot Walter J. Mayer was turning to approach the bomb run on the tertiary target, the group was in excellent formation when about 40 enemy ME-109 and FW-190 fighters attacked the formation. They were determined, efficient and experienced.

After encountering a lot of enemy fire, they headed towards the home base alone. The plane was badly damaged with holes throughout and the electrical system was knocked out. The bomb bay doors were stuck open after the bombs had been dropped to reduce weight. A B-17 cannot land with the bomb bay doors open and they would create a lot of wind drag so Lt. Mayer directed Douglas to go back and see if he could close them manually if necessary. Douglas walked out onto the narrow catwalk between the racks where the bombs are stored and proceeded to try using a crank handle to close the doors.

Ernest Tuescher, the radio operator on that flight, survived and had this to say:

"MURDER NEAR MAGDEBURG

I was radio operator on the Walter Mayer crew. We were shot down on September 28, 1944 on the mission to Magdeburg. We had our two right engines shot out and made it back to seven miles on the U.S. side of the front lines, in Luxemburg, where we bailed out. Douglas Hicks, our engineer, had bailed out near the target. Two German storm troopers went to pick him up. They began beating him up. Some slave laborers went to his aid. When the two SS men saw they were outnumbered, they shot and killed Hicks. Three missions after Magdeburg, we crash-landed at a fighter strip in Belgium where we smashed up the B-17, a B-24 and two fighter planes. Ernest Tuescher, 358th Radio Operator"

Ernest also told Mark Landry in an interview about Douglas, "He was the type of guy that any mother would love to have their daughters marry. He was the nicest guy. There was nothing that he did that you would be ashamed of." Pilot Walter Mayer told Mark Landry in an interview that "surgeons normally issued whiskey to crews that came back from tough missions but Douglas never took any."

The VFW Post 7389 in Westminster is named for Douglas E. Hicks.

WORLD WAR II VETERANS

We are very pleased to have the diary of Willard Gates in our collection. It details his service in the Army Air Force. He fought in French Morocco, Sicily and Normandy. It has been digitized for anyone interested in learning about his experiences.

After he returned home Willard wrote:

"The trip by plane was a very interesting trip, with 2 stop oversin Casablanca Africa, and Santa Maria, Azore Island and finally landing again in the good old U.S. at Presque Isle Maine and making the final trip by train ..., before going to Fort Devens where I received my discharge on the 28th of July 1945 after spending 3 years, 3 months and 22 days in the service of the U.S. Army from April 7 1942 to July 28 1945 and now that peace once again reigns, I sincerely hope that this will end all hostilities for everyone."

RAEFIELD HICKS

Raefield Hicks was born May 3, 1922 in Westminster to Charles and Esther Hicks. He was

a carpenter by trade and worked with his father at his box shop.

Raefield enlisted in the Army on December 31, 1941 in Boston and trained as a mechanic in the Army Air Force. He was assigned to the 106th Infantry Division in Indiana



and then joined the 3rd Air Force and ended up in in Nebraska December 2, 1944 attached to the 15th Bombardment Squadron.

Raefield flew to Hawaii and from there to the Marshall Islands and onto Guam on June 5, 1945 preparing to see action in the Pacific. The Japanese surrendered on September 2, 1945 and on November 15 Raefield boarded an LST to Hawaii and after a long journey across the U.S. reached Fort Devens on the day after Christmas. He was discharged two days later.

LAWRENCE HICKS

Born July 12, 1927 in Westminster to Charles and Esther H. Hicks. He enlisted into the Marine Corps Reserve two months before his 18th birthday. He went through boot camp at Parris Island in South Carolina and was transferred to Camp Lejeune, North Carolina for more training. A few weeks later he was sent to Camp Pendleton, California in anticipation of being sent to the Pacific Theater.

GRANT AWARDED TO WHS

The Westminster Historical Society has received a matching grant from the 1772 Foundation working in partnership with Preservation Massachusetts. A grant of \$2,700 was awarded to make repairs to the front of the house, where the water table has rotted. The wood will be replaced and the lower part of the wall be made water tight so that the sill on the house does not rot, which would be a much greater problem in the future.

Erin Kelly, the president of Preservation Massachusetts, stated that the staff of this matching grant program "saw the dramatic need, exacerbated by the impact of the ongoing pandemic. Out of 64 letters of inquiry, 28 full applications were invited, requesting over \$230,000 in grant funds. With only \$125,000 to grant, the process was extremely difficult. 16 grants were recommended for funding that represented a variety of projects"

The Historical Society is honored to have been one of the 16 recipients. We will be hiring a preservation contractor who will do this repair work and we plan to make a video of the work being done to help educate people who own old houses in town and want to learn the basics of maintaining them.

The Westminster Historical Society was pleased to be able to give a History Award to two students this June for their excellence in history. One was given to a fifth grader at the Westminster Elementary School. The other was given to , an 8th grader at the Middle school.

UPTON SCHOOL UPDATE

In May the Westminster Selectboard sent us their decision that they do not intend to take the Upton School back for the Town. They requested that the Town be given a portion of the proceeds of the sale of the building, after the expenses incurred in upkeep and repairs of the building have been cataloged. We are in the process of compiling an accurate list., and will then negotiate with the Town.

As you recall, after two years of painstaking assessment and struggling to make the best outcome for the Society and the Upton School, the difficult decision was made to sell the building. The building was shown to three brokers and an auctioneer who were enthusiastic that the building would be a good property to sell. The Board is working to find an appropriate buyer for this beautiful building!

UPDATE ON OLD TOWN HALL

In June, the Westminster Selectboard were presented with 3 proposals for the use of old town hall. One was from a developer who intended to make apartments; a second was from a community group which planned to remove the first floor and use the two remaining floors for community purposes. The third proposal was from the Historic Meetinghouse Coalition, of which the Historical Society was a key partner. This plan intended to use all three floors, with the first floor incorporating a visitors center, meeting spaces, commercial kitchen and a coffee shop; the second floor offering a stage for concerts, recitals, and plays, and an auditorium for dances and large gatherings; and the third floor for the Historical Society collections and work spaces for volunteers.

On Monday, August 2, the Selectboard announced that they have rescinded the previous call for proposals for the utilization of the old town hall. They will issue another request for proposals and this time will make more clear their objectives in the process and the desired outcome for the use of the building.

Our Board of Directors has some important decisions to make in the near future. In 1997 we identified the extreme lack of space in our Main Street building. We have kept you, our members, informed through the past 20 years as we've worked towards achieving our goal to find additional space for the environmentally safe storage and exhibit of its collections and for public programs.


